Important Points

Develop a routine (start at head & work down) Don't stop once you find a problem Examine babies



What is the first step in a physical exam?

Observing the animal in the cage





What do you look for when examining Eyes?

Clear & equally dilated Nystagmus or twitches Cuts, abrasions, discharge, swelling Blood in or around eye

Gums & palate normal color (pink for most animals) and moist or pale

Check capillary refill time

Lesions, plaques, parasites, abscesses, excessive salivation, froth

Examine teeth

Hinge joint of jaw working, aligned properly

Check nares for discharge, bleeding, infection, sores, growths, and parasites

Normal air movement sounds

Fractures/dislocations, muscle tears, tendon problems
